4. Trustee Report – Don Irwin

- Annual Education results report ***document attached***

- Sherwood Heights School is top priority for replacement – pushing for a new build, not a renovation

5. Admin Report – Mrs. Kaye Schindeler

- **Field trip feedback from parents:**
 - i. **Are fees too high? Some are not being paid** – no, costs have been reasonable
 - ii. **Should we reduce the number?** – no
 - iii. **How can we make improvements?** – give reminders from power school to notify of payments due/overdue, teacher/parent reminders, educate parents by showing step by step instructions on how to pay online, set a fee due at the beginning of the year at a maximum of \$85

- 100% fundraiser – total of \$3515 as of February 12th

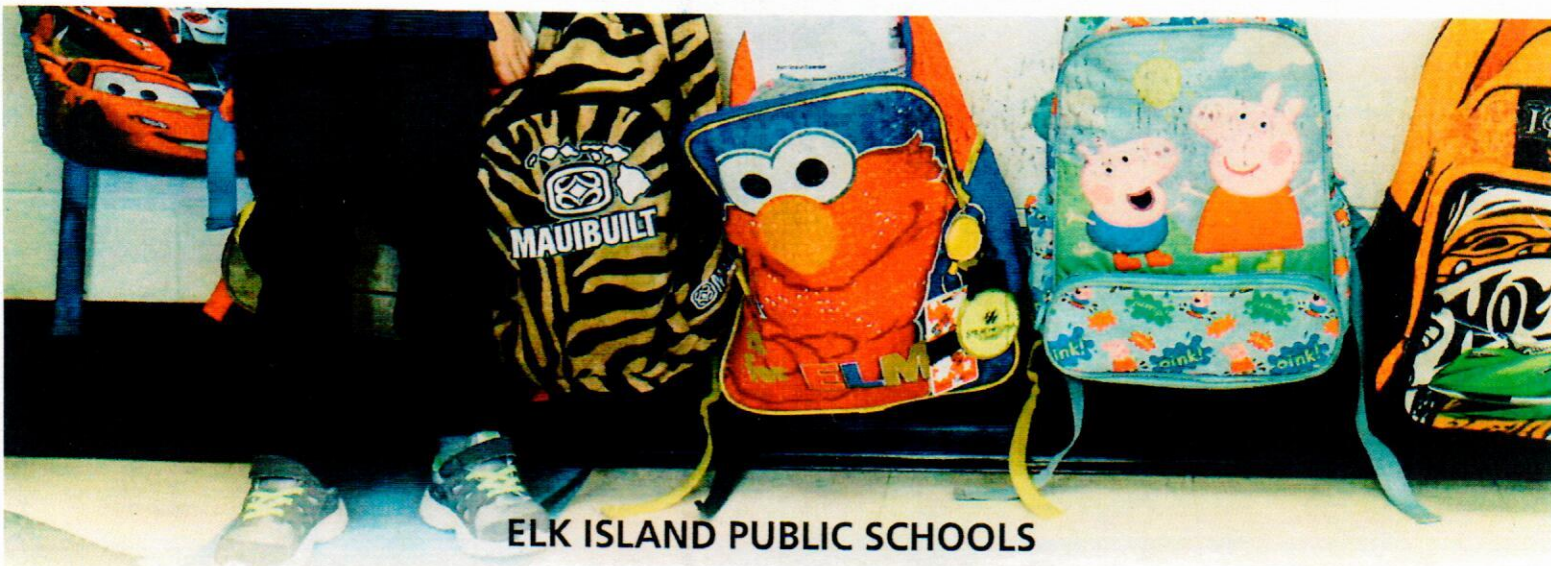

FOUR-YEAR EDUCATION PLAN 2018-22: PRIORITY SUMMARY

PRIORITY 1: Promote Growth and Success for all Students

GOAL 1: AN EXCELLENT START TO LEARNING

Results

- 1,436 children were enrolled in Early Childhood Services.
- 473 children were provided with ongoing speech-language services.
- 281 children were provided with ongoing occupational therapy.
- 5 children were provided with ongoing physical therapy.

Strategies 2018-19

- Implement a new performance measure to assess early learners' progress meeting developmental milestone and early literacy outcomes.
- Use the performance measure to examine the impact of the Division's early learning programming and services.

GOAL 2: SUCCESS FOR EVERY STUDENT

Results

- Grades 6 and Grade 9 Provincial Achievement Test (PAT) results are consistently higher than the province at both the acceptable standard and the standard of excellence—EIPS scored higher on 26 of the 28 PAT measures.
- Diploma examinations results are consistently higher than the province at the acceptable standard category—EIPS scored higher on 14 of the 18 diploma examination measures.
- The achievement gap is closing between self-identified First Nations, Métis and Inuit students and all other students. In some cases, self-identified First Nations, Métis and Inuit students outperformed all other students.

Strategies 2018-19

- Enhance teaching practice and expertise in literacy and numeracy.
- Address and close the gap between language arts and mathematics PAT and diploma examination results.
- Continue to deepen student and staff understanding of First Nations, Métis and Inuit history, treaty rights and the impact of residential schools.

GOAL 3: SUCCESS BEYOND HIGH SCHOOL

Results

- The high school completion rate is "very high."
- The dropout rate decreased to 1.1%.
- The number of students who transition to post-secondary and apprenticeships within six years of entering Grade 10 is rated "high."
- 81% of parents feel their child's being taught the knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary to be successful in life.

Strategies 2018-19

- Continue to provide opportunities for students to have access to meaningful and relevant learning experiences and be taught attitudes and behaviours that make them successful at work.
- Increase the number of students successfully transitioning to work or post-secondary education.

PRIORITY 2: Enhance High-Quality Learning and Working Environments

GOAL 1: A FOCUS ON WELL-BEING INCLUDING STUDENT CITIZENSHIP AND STAFF ENGAGEMENT

Results

- 88% of teachers, parents and students agree students are safe at school, learning the importance of caring for others, learning respect for others and treated fairly in school.
- 94% of staff feel they have the materials and equipment needed to do their work.
- 89% of staff are satisfied with their school or department as a place to work.

Strategies 2018-19

- Expand resources and offer professional learning opportunities that support students in managing personal wellness.
- Continue efforts to create welcoming, caring, respectful and safe learning and working environments.

GOAL 2: QUALITY INFRASTRUCTURE FOR ALL

Results

- Construction for Ardrossan Elementary and Davidson Creek Elementary was completed and the design phase was finalized for the Wye Elementary replacement school.
- All school backup server storage was moved to the Microsoft Azure cloud service.
- In total, 9,369 students were transported on 161 EIPS buses—the average ride was 28.35 minutes.

Strategies 2018-19

- Create a one-stop services centre to funnel all maintenance, operation and IMR requests.
- Develop and maintain a digital student-record system.
- System-wide transportation route optimization to ensure EIPS continues to provide safe and efficient transportation.

GOAL 3: BUILD CAPACITY

Results

- 89% of certificated staff report the professional learning offered is focused on the EIPS priorities.
- 91% of all staff feel professional learning is encouraged within the Division.

Strategies 2018-19

- Create and distribute a professional learning catalogue highlighting opportunities for staff.
- Continue professional learning in response to student achievement results.

GOAL 4: A CULTURE OF EXCELLENCE AND ACCOUNTABILITY

Results

- 89% of teachers, parents and students are satisfied with the overall quality of basic education.
- 86% of parents are satisfied with the quality of teaching at their child's school.

Strategies 2018-19

- Continue to focus on evidence-based decision-making by using data and research based on best practices that have the greatest impact on student learning.

PRIORITY 3: Enhance Public Education Through Effective Engagement, Partnerships and Communication

GOAL 1: PARENTS AS PARTNERS

Results

- 78% of EIPS parents and teachers are satisfied with the parental involvement taking place within the Division.
- 86% of EIPS families report EIPS schools keep them informed about their child's progress and achievement.
- Topics discussed at Committee of School Councils meeting were shared with school council groups.
- The annual Results Review process offered school communities a more holistic understanding of how schools are doing.
- Parent engagement focused on four key areas: literacy, numeracy, health and wellness.

Strategies 2018-19

- Provide literacy and numeracy tips to support parents in engaging their child's literacy and numeracy development.
- Provide consultants to present to groups of parents to support their child's growth.
- Continue to inform EIPS families about the initiatives and events taking place throughout EIPS.
- Enhance engagement with school councils and Committee of School Councils (COSC).

GOAL 2: SUPPORTS AND SERVICES FOR STUDENTS AND FAMILIES

Results

- EIPS maintained 197 school partnerships.
- EIPS maintained 89 partnerships through the Supports for Students department.

Strategies 2018-19

- Implement the online partnership-recording tool to identify partnerships and how they relate to the Division's Four-Year Education Plan.

GOAL 3: ENGAGED AND EFFECTIVE GOVERNANCE

Results

- EIPS trustees took an active role to increase public awareness around nine advocacy topics: predictable, sustainable funding; school board autonomy; infrastructure; processes and management; school planning; Alberta Education's direction; transportation funding; student and family well-being; reserves; and urban and rural schools.

Strategies 2018-19

- Continue to build relationships with elected government officials.
- Develop and maintain focused advocacy plans.
- Strategically partner with organizations, other levels of government, other school boards and media to advance advocacy efforts.
- Develop a strategy for advocacy efforts leading into the provincial election and a strategy for post-election advocacy.
